Let the VOTERS Decide!

As of June 2008, 2.7 million Arizonans registered to vote!

Of this amount, 507,442 (19%) are listed by the Secretary of State as “inactive” – meaning they have died or moved away and no longer reside in Arizona.

Chicago-Style Politics

If Majority Rules passes, these half million non-existent voters will each be given a NO vote on matters important to Arizona.

Only in Chicago can dead people and people living in California still vote and make decisions for concerned voters.

Voters Who Care

In 2006, 1.5 million Arizonans voted creating a 60% turnout.

In 2006, Prop 103, English as the Official Language, 74% of voted Arizonans voted YES.

Under Majority Rules, it would have FAILED because more than 83% of all registered voters – living or dead - would have to agree.

In 2006, Prop 207, Private Property Rights Protection, 65% of voting Arizonans voted YES.

In 2006, Prop 203, Early Childhood Education, 53% of voting Arizonans voted YES.

Under Majority Rules, these would have FAILED because more than 83% of all registered voters – living or dead - would have had to agree.

The Rights of Actual Voters

Majority Rules virtually removes the right of citizens to petition government in Arizona.

Majority Rules would allow 19% of registered people (half million) to have their so-called votes counted in every election.

The Majority DOES Rule Already

The Majority Rules Proposition will allow 19% of people registered at one time in Arizona and who no longer live here or have died to control the outcome of elections.

It allows non-voters to have their vote counted without going to the polls.

Vote NO on Majority Rules!

Voters should be Arizona citizens who are alive and care enough to cast their ballot, whether by mail or in-person.

In the 2006 General Election, 1.5 million Arizonans voted – a 60% turnout. Each voter was alive and living in our state – let Arizonans make decisions for Arizona!
