YOUR LEGISLATORS' VOTING RECORD ON SMALL-BUSINESS ISSUES | 2006 EDITION

Issues: 2006 Session Roll-call votes by your state legislators on small-business issues are listed below. While the *Voting Record* does not reflect all elements considered by a lawmaker when voting, it can be a guide in evaluating your legislators' attitudes toward small business. Please thank those who voted for NFIB positions in support of small business.

1. Corporate Tax Loophole Legislation Amendment (HB 4169):

Would increase tax assessments on large and small corporations by \$85 million on top of \$90 million in the current bill and nearly \$300 million collected from businesses in tax loophole closing laws passed in 2004 and 2005. **A "No" vote supports the NFIB position.** Defeated in the House 45 – 109. (2005)

2. Retroactive Capital Gains Tax Amendment (HB 4163):

Would change the effective date of the capital-gains tax increase to Jan. 1, 2003, halting the imposition of a retroactive capital-gains tax increase on gains realized in early 2002. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Defeated in the House 45 – 105. (2005)

3. Income Tax Reduction Amendment (HB 4169):

Would amend the bill to include a provision to lower the state income-tax rate to 5 percent. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Defeated in the Senate 6 – 32. (2005)

4. Minimum Corporate Tax Amendment (HB 4381):

Would exempt domestic corporations that are liable for the current minimum corporate tax for the first two years of the corporation's operation to encourage and support small start-up businesses.

A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.

Defeated in the House 38 – 116. (2005)

5. Health-Care Reform Amendment (HB 4463):

Would eliminate from the proposed law the provision assessing a new payroll tax on employers to fund mandatory health insurance. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Defeated in the House 24 – 129. (2005)

6. Unemployment Insurance Amendment (HB 4429):

Would amend the bill to lower the unemployment insurance taxable wage base from \$14,000 to \$12,800 to help lower the state's highest-in-the-nation UI taxes. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Defeated in the Senate 7 – 32. (2005)

7. Regulatory Impact Statement (HB 4429):

Would require state government agencies to assess the financial impact of proposed new state regulations on small businesses prior to promulgating those regulations. **A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.** Defeated in the Senate 6 – 33. (2005)

8. Health-Care Reform Amendment (HB 4479):

Would allow small businesses to join together through Small-Business Health Plans to negotiate favorable health-care premiums for themselves and their employees.

A "Yes" vote supports the NFIB position.

Defeated in the Senate 11 – 27. (2005)

9. Corporate Tax Loophole Legislation (HB 4169):

Would increase tax assessments on large and small corporations and impose an increased capital-gains tax retroactively on gains realized in early 2002. **A "No" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed in the Senate 26 – 12. (2005)

10. Income Tax Reduction Amendment (HB 4900):

Would prevent a vote on a budget amendment to reduce the state income tax rate to 5 percent by referring the issue to a study of the reduction's financial impact on the state. **A "No" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed in the House 129 – 22. (2006)

11. Health-Care Reform Amendment (HB 4479):

Would override governor's veto of an assessment of \$295 per employee on employers who do not offer health insurance to employees. **A "No" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed in the House 137 – 20. (2006)

12. Streamlined Permitting (HB 4741):

Would expedite and streamline state and local permitting of development projects to improve Massachusetts' competitiveness with

other states. A “Yes” vote supports the NFIB position. Passed in the House 134 – 15 (2006)

13. Health-Care Constitutional Amendment (SB 4): Would refer to a special committee the proposed amendment that would grant individuals a constitutional right to comprehensive and affordable health care. A “Yes” vote supports the NFIB

position. Passed in the House 95 – 60; passed in the Senate 23 – 16. (2006)

14. Streamlined Permitting Amendment (HB 4741): Would ensure passage of expedited permitting legislation as originally intended by eliminating previously adopted Senate amendments that were rejected by the House. A “Yes” vote sup-

ports the NFIB position. Passed in the Senate 24 – 12. (2006)
