Votes by your state legislators on key small business issues are listed here. Although this Voting Record does not reflect all elements considered by a lawmaker when voting, nor does it represent a complete profile of a legislator, it can be a guide in evaluating your legislator's attitudes toward small business. Please thank those legislators who supported small business.

BOTH CHAMBERS

1. Municipal tax code notice requirements (2025 - HB 2119): Requires municipalities to provide advance notice before making changes to the model city tax code, giving small businesses time to prepare for local tax changes. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the House 51-5. Passed the Senate 30-0. Signed by the governor.

2. Construction hours flexibility (2025 - SB 1182): Prohibits municipalities and counties from restricting construction hours in a manner that increases project costs for small contractors and builders. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 23-3. Passed the House 51-7. Signed by the governor.

3. Federal tax conformity (2026 - HB 2785): Conforms Arizona's tax code to current federal Internal Revenue Code deductions, preventing small businesses from paying higher state taxes than federal law requires. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the House 32-26. Passed the Senate 17-13. Vetoed by the governor.

4. Tax law interpretation and administrative hearings (2026 - SB 1221): Establishes clearer standards for how state agencies interpret and apply tax laws, providing small businesses greater certainty and fairness in administrative proceedings. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 16-11. Passed the House 32-24.

SENATE ONLY

5. Personal property exemption; increase (2025 - SB 1069): Increases the business personal property tax exemption to \$500,000. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 17-9. Held in House.

6. Municipal and county fee increase restrictions (2025 - SB 1013): Requires municipalities and counties to obtain voter approval before imposing new or increased fees on businesses and residents. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 17-12. Held in House.

7. Revenue increase and administrative fee limitations (2025 - SCR 1009): Proposes a constitutional restriction on the ability of state agencies to impose or increase administrative fees without legislative approval. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 17-11. Held in House.

HOUSE ONLY

8. Merchant; fees; calculation; transactions; penalty (2025 - HB 2629): Prohibits payment card networks and issuers from charging interchange fees on the tax portion of electronic payment transactions, establishes a process for merchants to recover such fees, and imposes a \$1,000 civil penalty per violation. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Failed in the House 23-31.

9. Mandatory cash acceptance (2025 - HB 2683): Would require all businesses to accept cash as a form of payment, removing the ability of small business owners to make their own decisions about accepted payment methods. **A "NO" vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the House 45-15. Held in Senate.

10. TPT sourcing rules (2026 - HB 2290): Clarifies the sourcing rules for transaction privilege tax purposes, ensuring that small businesses are taxed based on the location where business activity actually occurs rather than ambiguous administrative interpretations. **A "YES" vote supports the NFIB position.** Failed in the House 24-31.
